GENERAL RULES

1. The schedule is the Law of the Show. The 2007 Edition of the National Garden Club Handbook for Flower Shows and any amendments published in The National Gardener shall be used as the authority for exhibiting and judging the show.
2. The design division and educational exhibits are open to any member of the Northeast Alabama Federation of Garden Clubs. The Horticulture division is open to any amateur grower.
3. There must be an emphasis on fresh material in each division; no artificial plant material is allowed in any division (page 188 of NGC Handbook, 2007). The use of any plant on the state conservation list of endangered or threatened species, regardless of how obtained, is not permitted.
4. Entries will be received from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, September 24, and Sunday, September 25, 2011. The horticulture classification chairman will check entries for conformity to the schedule. Design consultants will check design entries for conformity to the schedule.
5. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, September 26, 2011. Only judges, clerks, entry chairman and placement chairperson will be allowed in the exhibition area during judging.
6. The show will be open to the public beginning at 5 p.m. Monday through Friday (September 26-September 30), and 10:00 a.m. Saturday (October 1) until Fair closing time.
7. All Exhibits must be removed on Sunday, October 2, 2010, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Dismantling will begin at 1 p.m.
8. The Flower Show Committee shall exercise due caution and care in the safeguarding of exhibits and properties, but cannot assume responsibility for damages or loss of personal property of exhibitors.

AWARDS

1. The NGC standard system of judging and awarding will be used. Judges' decisions will be final. An award may be withheld if not merited.
2. One *First Place* (blue ribbon) scoring 90 or above, one *Second Place* (red ribbon) scoring 85 or above, one *Third Place* (yellow ribbon), scoring 80 or above, may be awarded in each class where merited. One or more *Honorable Mention* (white ribbon), scoring 75 or above, may be awarded. Judges are requested to write 90+ and sign all 90+ ribbons.
3. An *Award of Merit*, (4) a rosette of orange ribbons, may be awarded to the highest scoring named blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, each in Section C, D, E, and F of Division I (page 121 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
4. The *Arboreal Award*, (1) a rosette of two shades of green ribbons, may be awarded to the highest scoring named blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, in Section A of Division I (page 121 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
5. The *Grower's Choice Award* (2), a rosette of dark green ribbons, maybe awarded to exhibits scoring 95 or above in Section I and J of Division I (page 121 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
6. The *Award of Horticultural Excellence*, (1) a rosette of green, orange, and blue ribbons, may be awarded to the named blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above judged to be the finest in the entire Horticulture Division (Division I) (page 43 of NGC Handbook, 2007).

7. The *Club Competition Award*, (1) a rosette of light blue ribbons, may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Section A of Design Division, Division II. This class is not eligible for other top exhibitor awards. There must be a minimum of four (4) exhibits in each class (page 52 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
8. The *Tricolor Award*, a rosette of blue, red, and yellow ribbons, may be awarded in Section B, Division II, Section B, to a blue ribbon winner design scoring 95 or above in which all plant material used is fresh. Decorative wood is NEVER allowed; however, non-plant material may be included and may dominate. There must be a minimum of four (4) exhibits in each class (page 46, 3-c of MGC Handbook, 2007).
9. The *Designer's Choice Award* may be awarded a blue ribbon winner for scoring 95 or above in Section C, Division II. Exhibitor has complete freedom to choose components. *Designer's Choice Award* is of purple ribbons. There must be a minimum of four (4) exhibits in each class (page 47-48 of MGC Handbook, 2007).
10. The *Petite Award* may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or more, in Section E, Division II. *The Petite Award* is small and of blue and white ribbons. There must be a minimum of four (4) exhibits in each class (page 49, 7-c of MGC Handbook, 2007).
11. The *Award of Design Excellence* may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit of the entire Design Division. The *Award of Design Excellence* is a rosette of gold ribbons (pages 45-46 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
12. The *Sweepstakes Award* will be awarded to the exhibitor winning the largest number of points. Two (2) *Sweepstakes Awards* may be awarded: one (1) in the Division I, Horticulture and one (1) in Division II, Design.
The method of tabulation shall be ten (10) points for each blue ribbon, and five (5) points for each red ribbon used only to break possible ties. *Sweepstakes Award* is a rosette of green and white ribbons (page 54 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
12. The *Educational Award* may be awarded in Division III, Section A, Class 118, to a blue ribbon exhibit scoring 95 or above. *Education Award* is a rosette of brown and white ribbons (pages 49-50 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
13. Seven *Youth Awards*, may be awarded if merited in the special Exhibits Division III, Section B. Each group of classes is eligible for a *Youth Top Exhibitor Award*. Top youth award winning exhibits must each score 90 or above, judged by adult scales of points. Youth Awards are of red, white, and blue ribbons (page 51 of NGC Handbook, 2007).
14. Awards may be withheld if not merited.

Horticulture

~ RULES FOR HORTICULTURE ~

1. Horticulture Classes are open to any amateur grower.
2. All exhibits, whether cut or container-grown, must be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor.
3. Cut annuals and biennials must have been in exhibitor's possession from seeds; cuttings or immature plants, perennials for at least 90 days; bulbous blooms from planting of bulb, tuber corm, etc. for at least 90 days.

4. Container grown plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least ninety (90) days.
5. All specimens should be labeled, giving genus and species or cultivar; variety may be added when available. The common name also may be added. Only specimens so labeled will be eligible for any Top Award. The Classification Committee will be available for assistance.
6. Exhibitor may enter only one specimen per class.
7. The Committee will furnish entry tags which should be filled out in advance (if possible) using a pencil or waterproof pen. When handwritten, genus, species, and variety names are underlined. Tags are available from each individual garden club or the Entries Chairman.
8. Stem length of cut specimens must be in good proportion to the bloom, strong and sturdy enough to support foliage. Arboreal exhibits and vines may be no longer than 24 inches and should have a terminal node and several leaf nodes. Other horticulture exhibits may be no longer than 20 inches.
9. Exhibits should be of show quality with no oiling, dressing, wiring, spraying or artificial coloring. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line (exception: gladiolus). Beauty Berry and Chinese Latern foliage may be removed. Geraniums should be shown with some natural foliage.
10. Wedging (using a small, inconspicuous "plug" in the neck of a container to improve the pose of specimen) is permitted. Wedging material will be provided and placed by placement committee.
11. Pots and baskets for container grown plants may not exceed 12 inches in diameter.
12. Decorative pots are not allowed. Double potting is permitted.
13. Plants grown primarily for their flowers must be in bloom to be exhibited.
14. The Committee will furnish containers for all cut specimens.
15. The Committee regrets that due to space limitations, combination plantings cannot be accepted in Section I, J and K. Elephant ears (*Calocasia esculenta*) and Angel's Trumpet (*Brugmansia*) cannot be accepted in Section D or in the Youth Division.
16. The Classification Committee must approve all entries, and shall be the final authority to disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule and/or not of flower show quality.
17. Classification Committee has the authority to subdivide classes as necessary.
18. Questions may be directed to the Horticulture Classification Chairman.
19. Horticulture is judged by the scale of points on pages 298-301 of the NGC 2007 Edition of the Handbook for Flower Shows.

Design

RULES FOR DESIGNS

1. Design Division is reserved for garden club members in the Northeast Alabama Federation. With the exception of Class 106 and 107, *Garden Club Design*, each design must be the work of one exhibitor and must not have been exhibited in previous flower shows. Class 114, *Novice*, is open only to any club member who is not a previous blue ribbon winner.
2. Class 106 and 107 are eligible for the *Club Competition Award*, and may be a collaborative effort of several club members. The entry card must have the club's name and its president's name.

3. Some plant material must be used in ever design. Fresh plant material must NOT be treated. The exhibitor need not grow plant material used in designs; however, no artificial flowers or foliage are permitted in any class. Fresh fruits and vegetables are permitted, but no other foods. Fruits and vegetables must be sealed if cut (page 188, F1-2 of the NGC Handbook, 2007).
4. Objects allowed to create interest are subject to NGC Handbook rules (pp. 189-190, 2007).
5. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted in Design Division.
6. Four (4) entries in each class are required. All design entries must be pre-registered. Each exhibitor must be responsible for making a reservation with the Design Consultant in the class he/she wishes to enter. Design Consultants are listed under each design section.
7. Reservations should be made no later than September 5, 2011. In the event the exhibitor has to cancel after that date, he/she shall be responsible for getting a replacement.
8. One exhibitor in the Design Division may enter no more than three (3) classes; except that after registration date of September 5, any exhibitor not previously entered in that class may fill any unfilled spaces.
9. Exhibitors are requested to give a brief interpretation of their designs on the certificate provided by the committee.
10. Prior to placement and before the exhibitor leaves the exhibit area; the Design Consultant must check all designs and shall be the final authority to disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule.
11. Designs are judged by the scale of points listed on 303 of the NGC Handbook, 2007.
12. Judges are requested to write constructive comments on design certificates, and to sign all 90+ ribbons (writing 90+ and signature).
13. Exhibitor should strive to keep materials fresh for the duration of the show.

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Section B. Youth

Youth Rules

1. Youth exhibitors are required to conform to the same rules governing the adult sections of the flower show with these exceptions:
 - Youth exhibitor must have had possession of container grown plants for at least 60 days. Combination plantings must have been grown together for at least 3 weeks;
 - Youth Educational exhibits require a minimum of only six square feet and may be created by more than one youth;
 - There are no required minimum number classes or exhibits.
2. All youth designs must be created and horticultural exhibits grown by one youth.
